Mayor Jasso called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

1. Consent Agenda

Mr. Sera brought attention to Item C. in the Parks Commission Meeting of 5/12/15. He stated that there are two recommendations from that meeting. One is to approve the installation of portable restrooms at Pit Park, Girl Scout Park, Florida Park and John T. Waits Park. The other recommendation is to follow the current park reservation process through the City for the use of Pocket Park, and asking MainStreet to assign someone to open and close the park.

Mr. Sera went on to mention item D. in the Planning & Zoning Commission Meeting of 5/18/15. He noted that there were three recommendations made at this meeting and they will all be presented later in the meeting as Quasi-Judicial Public Hearings.

Mr. Sera stated that in item E. in the Tourism Development Committee Meeting of 5/20/15, the following recommendation was made to award agency funding from the TDC promotional fund:

- Old Timers \$1,000
- Black Range Artists \$2,532
- Gen & Mineral Society \$6,135
- Great American Duck Race \$5,500
- Southern Luna County Economic Development \$2,500
- Luna County Historical Society \$5,000

A note was made regarding the misnumbering of items in the consent agenda. There are two letter "E" items.

Another recommendation he noted was the recommendation to renew the contract with Fun and Games.

Mr. Sera spoke on item F. Appointment of Cassie Arias as the city representative to the Green Energy Task Force Board.

Mr. Sera mentioned that item G. Approval/Denial of a Resolution for Participation in the 2015-2016 Local Government Road Fund Program (LGRF) is an annually passed resolution which is required in order to execute an agreement to participate in the program.

Mr. Sera spoke about the items H. and I., the Police Department and Fire Department union negotiations. He stated that the major increase in the Fire Department Agreement was an increase in the clothing allowance for boots. The allowance went from \$85 to \$125, although their boots cost from \$150 to \$200. Another increase for the Fire Department is for call-back pay. This amount was increased to \$1 per hour over their regular hourly rate for those employees responding to call-backs.

He stated that the Police Department requested and was granted an increase for uniforms for the Special Response Team.

Councilor Sanchez asked if all awarded funding from the Tourism Development Committee were budgeted. Mr. Sera confirmed that they were.

Councilor Sanchez moved to approve the consent agenda, as presented. Mayor Pro Tem Milo seconded the motion.

Councilor Cruz asked how TDC determines the amounts to fund each entity. Mr. Sera explained the process and stated that the entities submit a proposal, with a budget and explanation of how the funds will be used. A brief discussion was entertained between staff and Council.

Mayor Jasso asked Council for their vote on the motion previously made. The motion carried unanimously.

2. Public Forum

Mayor Jasso opened the public forum session for comment. The following person spoke:

3. Approval/Denial of a Resolution to Consider a Minimum Wage Increase for Full-Time Internal City of Deming Employees

Mr. Sera read the resolution into record with emphasis on the fact that this resolution applies only to employees of the City of Deming.

Councilors Cruz and Sanchez expressed their support of this resolution.

Councilor Cruz moved to approve the resolution to Support the \$10.10 Minimum Wage for Full-Time Internal City of Deming Employees and to adjust the pay scale. Councilor Sanchez seconded the motion; motion carried unanimously by the following roll call vote:

4. Public Hearing to Consider an Ordinance Amending Title 9, Chapter 3 “Water and Sewer Rates and Charges” of the Municipal Code of the City of Deming

Mr. Massengill presented this item to Mayor and Council. He stated that the water rate, fees, and charges table presented shows the proposed incremental rate in which the rate will be charged per 100 gallons, from the previous rate charged per 748 gallons. He stated that this change will make it easier to calculate usage. Mr. Massengill noted that there has been no increase to the cost of water just a change in the base rate per gallons used. He noted that the change was initiated due to the new automated water meters that have recently been installed throughout the City. A brief discussion was entertained between staff and Council regarding the new water meters. Again, it was emphasized that there has been no water rate increase.

Mayor Jasso opened the hearing to the public for comments.

Lloyd Valentine, 1301 Alamogordo Street-stated that he feels this is a good change as it will be easier for the public to calculate. He suggested that he would like the City to share the efficiencies to the public regarding water conservation and accuracy of the bills.

Mayor Jasso closed the public comment session and entertained a motion from Council.

Councilor Sanchez moved to approve the ordinance amending Title 9, Chapter 3 “Water and Sewer Rates and Charges” of the Municipal Code of the City of Deming, with no rate increase. Councilor Rincon seconded the motion; motion carried unanimously.

5. Quasi-Judicial Public Hearing to Consider a Proposed Amendment to the Deming Municipal Code Regarding Use of Recreational Vehicles in Residential Zones

Mayor Jasso called to order the public hearing to consider a proposed amendment to the

Deming Municipal Code regarding use of recreational vehicles in residential zones. He confirmed with Council that there were no abstentions, ex-parte contacts, no conflicts of interest; that the legal notices were properly posted by the secretary and swore in all parties who would be giving testimony.

Gina Gentile, City Planner, presented the case to Mayor and Council. She stated that there are sections in the zoning code that specifically disallow living in RVs in the residential zones and other sections that do not have that wording. She noted that it also adds wording that allow a property owner to obtain three short-term permits per year for use of the RV for visitors. She went on to say that each permit will be limited to 4 days each. Ms. Gentile explained that this ordinance is being proposed to keep the zoning code consistent and also to make code enforcement a little easier regarding use of an RV as a dwelling. She noted that the planning commission recommends this ordinance amendment.

Mayor Jasso asked if there were any question of staff by any Council Member.

Mayor Pro Tem Milo asked what the cost of the permit will be. Ms. Gentile stated that at this time there is not a fee associated with the permit, it is mainly a means for the code enforcers to be aware of these types of situations.

Councilor Cruz asked if this has been a significant issue. Ms. Gentile stated that at least once per month, they have this type of situation. She noted that due to the ordinance being unclear, adding these sections makes code enforcement easier.

Councilor Sanchez asked if this code would pertain to new construction site in which someone is staying on-site in an RV to secure the building materials. Ms. Gentile stated that this is already part of the building code.

Mayor Jasso asked if any affected parties would like to speak.

James Richardson, 2609 Water Hazard Drive, asked if this ordinance change going to affect parking on the streets and alleys. Ms. Gentile stated that actually it is already prohibited for RVs to be parked in any City right-of-way, and encouraged Mr. Richardson give the City Code Enforcer a call, if he ever observes this. Ms. Gentile stated that this ordinance change will allow for an RV owner to park their RV on their property and let visitors stay in it for not more than four days at a time, 3 times a year.

Mayor Jasso closed the public comment session and entertained a motion from Council.

Mayor Pro Tem Milo moved to approve the amendment to the Deming Municipal Code Regarding use of Recreation vehicles in residential zones, as presented. Councilor Sanchez seconded the motion; motion carried by the follow roll call vote:

6. Quasi-Judicial Public Hearing to Consider a Proposed Partial Right-of-Way Vacation and Replat of Lots 85, 100 and 113 in the Industrial Park Area

Mayor Jasso called to order the public hearing to consider a proposed partial right-of-way vacation and replat of lots 85, 100 and 113 in the Industrial Park Area. He confirmed with Council that there were no abstentions, ex-parte contacts, no conflicts of interest; that the legal notices were properly posted by the secretary and swore in all parties who would be giving testimony.

Gina Gentile, City Planner, presented the case to Mayor and Council. She stated that this case is being requested by the City. She went on to say that there is a large triangular type area, at the corner of J Street and Country Club Road that is City right-of-way. She stated the request is to vacate that right-of-way and replat the lots in that area to incorporate the vacated land. She noted that staff has no technical objections to the request and it has been recommended by the Planning Commission. Ms. Gentile referred to the diagrams in the packet of the existing plat and replat and also pointed out the subject area on the map. She stated that it would be beneficial to square-up the lots and make them usable.

Mr. Sera stated that in the past, the area was used as a drainage ditch for water off of Pear Street. He stated that since the Pear Street drainage project, the water no longer drains to this area.

Councilor Cruz asked what initiated the City to replat the area. Mr. Sera stated that in the property adjacent to the subject area, there are storage units. He stated that the owner would like to expand his business and this would free up the lots for further development. Mr. Sera noted that the lots serve no purpose in their current state.

Mayor Jasso asked if any affected parties would like to speak. There were none.

Mayor Jasso asked if any other persons would like to speak. There were none.

Mayor Jasso closed the public comments and entertained a motion from Council.

Councilor Sanchez moved to approve the proposed partial right-of-way vacation and replat of lots 85, 100, and 113 in the Industrial Park Area, as presented. Councilor Rincon seconded the motion; motion carried unanimously by the following roll call vote:

7. Quasi-Judicial Public Hearing to Consider a Propose Message Board Sign at 2849 E. Pine Street

Mayor Jasso called to order the public hearing to consider a proposed message board sign at 2849 E. Pine Street. He confirmed with Council that there were no abstentions, ex-parte contacts, no conflicts of interest; that the legal notices were properly posted by the secretary and swore in all parties who would be giving testimony.

Gina Gentile, City Planner, stated that this case for a message board sign, which pursuant to Deming Municipal Code Section 11-1-2 requires approval by City Council and recommendation from the Planning Commission. She went on to say that the sign is located at Roadrunner RV at 2849 E. Pine Street and the sign was already put up without a permit. Ms. Gentile stated that the owner was contacted by the building inspector and informed that a special use permit is necessary for message signs. She stated that the applicant immediately came to the planning office and applied for the special use permit. Ms. Gentile stated that the sign shall comply with all other aspects of the sign code and building code. She noted that staff has no technical objections to this request, except that it must be inspected and found to comply with applicable building codes, including electrical code.

Mayor Jasso asked if Council had any questions of staff.

Councilor Cruz asked if the applicant already had the sign and if he made an addition to the sign. Ms. Gentile stated that he added the smaller sign which has moving lights and requires a special use permit. A brief discussion was entertained between Council and staff.

Mayor Jasso asked if the applicant meets electrical code requirement. Ms. Gentile stated that most likely it does not, but he was made aware that if the special use permit is approve, he will have to comply with all building and electrical code.

Mayor Jasso asked if the applicant/agent would like to make a statement. They were not present.

Mayor Jasso asked if there were any affected persons who would like to speak. There were none.

Mayor Jasso asked if there were any other persons who would like to speak. There were none.

Mayor Jasso closed the public hearing and entertained a motion from Council.

Councilor Sanchez moved to approve the proposed message board sign at 2849 E. Pine Street with the stipulation that the sign must comply with building and electrical codes. Mayor Pro Tem Milo seconded the motion; motion carried unanimously by the following roll call vote:

8. Administrator's Report

Mr. Sera reported on the following:

- Budget Workshop-a survey has been handed out to Council for their input and would like it turned in this week.
- Wireless Internet in the parks-a company that the City is working with would like to install wireless on the water towers and would like to have internet installed at 4 parks-Pit Park, John Waits, Brown, and Florida Parks. He stated that the WIFI in the Girl Scout Park seems to be working well; he is waiting on the reports from the company to check usage.
- Land Exchange with Deming Public Schools-working on finalizing the transaction, waiting on the approval from the Department of Finance.
- Fireworks Ban-Chief Mercado has been checking with the National Weather Service and doesn't feel a ban is necessary. He will keep monitoring to make sure the situation is safe.
- MainStreet- the Memorandum of Understanding with MainStreet is due to expire June 30th. In the Memorandum, it is stated that the City will fund them \$15,000 and

the County will fund \$15,000. Currently, the County is proposing to fund MainStreet \$15,000, if the City provides \$30,000. Mr. Sera explained that in addition to the \$15,000, the City also provides the match monies for grants and other in-kind services. He noted that last year the City funded MainStreet a total of \$32,000. He stated that the City cannot afford to fund MainStreet \$30,000 plus additional in-kind services. He is working with them to find a solution to this proposition by the County.

- o Arizona Water Settlement Act (AWSA)-There have been public meetings and workshops organized to explain the water diversion project. Mr. Sera stated that a presentation will be made at the Special Council Meeting scheduled on July 2nd at 9:00 a.m. At this meeting Mr. Sera hopes that the presentation by the Interstate Stream Commission representative will educate Council and the public about the project and clear up any miscommunications and misunderstandings.

Councilor Cruz asked how long the current Memorandum of Understanding has been in effect. Mr. Sera stated that it has been in effect for two years. A brief discussion was entertained between staff and Council regarding MainStreet.

9. Closed Session to Discuss the Purchase, Acquisition or Disposal of Real Property Regarding City of Deming Farms Pursuant to NMSA 1978 Section 10-15-1 (H)(8) of the Open Meetings Act

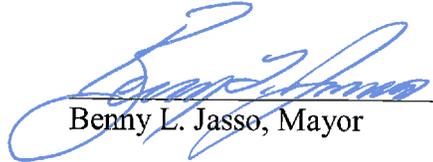
Mayor Jasso stated for the record that only the items mentioned in the motion to go into closed session were discussed and that no items were moved upon during the closed session.

ADMINISTERED BY NEW MEXICO DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION**

WHEREAS, the City of Deming and the New Mexico Department of Transportation enter into a cooperative agreement.

WHEREAS, the total minimum cost of the project will be \$60,000.00 to be funded in proportional share by the parties hereto as follows:

- a. New Mexico Department of Transportation's share shall be 75% or not exceed \$45,000.00, and
- b. City of Deming's proportional matching share shall be 25% or a minimum of \$15,000.00.

The City of Deming shall pay all costs, which exceed the total amount of \$60,000.00.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, in official session that City of Deming determines, resolves, and orders as follows:

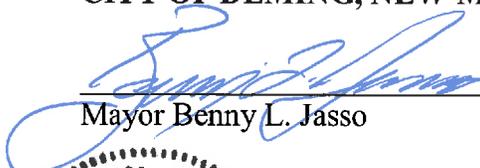
That the project for this Cooperative agreement is adopted and has a priority standing.

The agreement terminates on December 31, 2016 and the City of Deming incorporates all the agreements, covenants, and understandings between the parties hereto concerning the subject matter hereof, and all such covenants, agreements and understandings have been merged into the written agreement.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the City of Deming, to enter into Cooperative Agreement Project Number SP-1-16 (909), Control Number HW2 L100213 with the New Mexico Department of Transportation for LGRF Project for year 2015-2016 for "Design project management, milling & disposal of existing asphalt surface, replacement with new asphalt pavement, reconstruction of certain areas of current pavement failure to include subgrade, base course & asphalt paving, fog seal median and shoulders, ADA improvements as necessary – Cody Road – from Poplar Street to Florida Street".

WHEREAS, the study indicated that today's minimum wage is not enough for a single parent to reach even the most basic threshold of adequate living standards; and

WHEREAS, the City of Deming employs on average 160 people; and

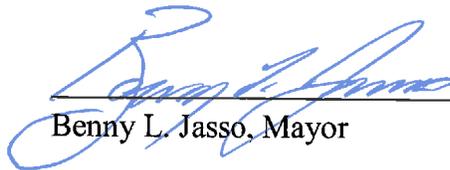
WHEREAS, the City of Deming promotes adequate living standards for our employees; and

WHEREAS, the City of Deming supports the \$10.10 minimum wage in its' internal hiring process and pay scale;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Governing Body in and for the City of Deming hereby approves the minimum pay for City of Deming full time employees to be \$10.10 effective July 1, 2015 and authorizes the City Administrator and City Treasurer to make changes to the pay scale and pay range necessary to accommodate this change.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, which the City of Deming encourages local governments and local businesses to consider a minimum wage increase to help promote adequate living standards amongst our community.

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING TITLE 9, CHAPTER 3
“WATER AND SEWER RATES AND CHARGES” OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE
OF THE CITY OF DEMING, NEW MEXICO**

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DEMING, NEW MEXICO:

1. Title 9, Chapter 3 Section 9-3-1, A. 2. of the City of Deming Municipal Code is hereby amended by deleting Section 9-3-1 A. 2. in its entirety and replace with the following:

SECTION 9-3-1 A. 2: Rates, Fees and Charges

2. Water User Rates: Water user rates shall be in accordance with the time period schedule and the payment schedule set out in the tables below:
